Please Do Your Part

help the person you came to see and hear, SWOBDA has some suggestions for you. Keep two words in mind, NOISE and MOVEMENT. If anyone makes noise or moves around the concert hall, the performers as well as the audience is distracted. Therefore, we ask that any movement be done during applause or after the concert. The appropriate place for conversation and crying children is in the lobby. If a work has several parts within it, applause should be held until after the last portion. Please remember that applause is the correct form of gratitude, not yelling or whistling. Proper concert behavior will help this occasion be positively remembered.
